Tackling courier fraud.

In the midst of the cost of living crisis, there has never been as great a need to protect vulnerable people from fraud and scams.

What is courier fraud?

It's a scam where criminals pretend to be the police or the victim's bank, tricking victims into providing banking details, withdrawing cash, foreign currency or purchasing gold, watches or other expensive items.

These items as well as bank cards, are handed over to strangers (known as couriers) who are posing as police or bank workers who come and collect these items from the victim.

Who is most at risk?

Around 60% of victims are over 70, and whilst the average loss per person is around £5,000, the highest single report last year was £640,000.

Our new campaign aims to drive people to report what they know about the criminals behind courier fraud by using **our unique anonymous reporting service.**



Educate. Solve. Support. Prevent.

Our campaign will take a comprehensive approach to raise awareness and drive reporting on courier fraud, as well as working with our partners to signpost to support avenues available for victims.

Educate the public on what courier fraud is and the impact it has on our communities.

Messaging will seek to **help solve courier fraud** by targeting audiences who may have information on the crime gangs behind it.

By targeting awareness messaging and highlighting the warning signs at potential victims and those close to them, as well as professionals in industries that may be able to witness this scam, we seek to **help prevent future victims from being defrauded.**

The campaign will signpost to **Action Fraud** and other available organisations that offer victims **support and advice.**
