Darlington is preparing to welcome four families displaced as a result of the conflict in Afghanistan. The UNITY group agreed to extend a warm welcome to them and offer assistance in any way they could. It was recognised that there are some in the town who will not be happy about this news, but it was the role of the UNITY group and others to ensure that it is support and friendship that wins the day, not mistrust and hatred.



Darlington PRIDE 2021

After a low key 2020 PRIDE, this year it was back, and it was bigger and better! A great range of entertainment on stage and plenty of stalls in the marketplace on the Saturday; a chilled-out picnic in the park on Sunday; a fun filled evening in the bars and clubs on Monday night.



National Hate Crime Awareness Week (HCAW) – 9th to 16th October 2021



Durham Police and Darlington Borough Council are organising a week-long series of online events focussing on HATE CRIME. Monday will see keynote speakers 'launch' the event and then each subsequent day will offer an opportunity for professionals and key members of our communities to learn about: reporting a hate crime and the police response; how a hate crime case is handled by the Crown Prosecution Service; what support is available to victims of hate incidents and crimes. On Friday there will be a 'summary of the week' and a chance to ask questions to a panel of subject experts. Members of the UNITY group will be involved in the planning of the event and many will be attending each days' events.

There will also be a couple of announcements made during the week which should help demonstrate that things are moving forward and fighting HATE in Darlington is still a priority, especially for the UNITY group.

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Cabinet members in Darlington Borough Council agreed a support package at the beginning of September and the council continues to work with central government and the North East Migration Partnership to ensure what is in place is suitable and in line with regional partners. Families will need to quarantine for the appropriate period of time after which they will be able to access support. It is expected that families will arrive by the end of September.

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We are making efforts every day to stop hate crime in Darlington, but NHCAW provides an opportunity to focus on hate crime and raise its profile in the press, social media and in the eyes of organisations who perhaps don't deal with hate crime issues that often.

One of the key issues is the high number of incidents that don't get reported. This means that the Police, Darlington Borough Council and others don't get a true picture of the problem in our area. It is vital to our fight against hate that we increase the number of incidents that are reported to the police. When crimes are reported we are able to start to identify potential offenders, 'hot spot' locations, the types of attack (verbal abuse, physical assault, online abuse, etc.) and the target of the attacks – disabled people, Muslim community, etc.

Even if a person reports an attack but does not give their name, the description of the attacker, where it happened, type of attack and the target of the attack can all provide the police with useful information that might help them identify the perpetrator and possibly stop attacks on others.

Did you know? You don't have to report a hate crime directly to the police.

If someone is convicted of a crime and it is proved it was motivated by hate then the Crown Prosecution Service (CPS) can apply to the courts for a 'sentence uplift'. This is an increased punishment for the crime and **more than half** of the CPS requests for uplifts last year led to offenders having their sentence increased **because it was motivated by hate.**
